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




Career Prospects

This enabled us to observe and analyse different events with macro perspective to develop our strength.

Through the Community Studies programme, I realise that there are many social norms in our society. From the viewpoint of the society, conforming social norms is necessary for practical reasons. People who violate social norms, even if they have sublime goals, will be considered as deviant who undermine social stability. However, who decides what's right and wrong? These social norms not only restrict people from making reasonable choices, but also hinder social progress.
